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Fiscal Conditions of the States

State fiscal conditions over the past several years have been heavily impacted by combination of federal COVID-19 aid and rising state tax collections.

States experienced double-digit growth in revenue collections in both fiscal 2021 and fiscal 2022 while total balances and rainy day funds reached record levels.

State spending growth remained strong in fiscal 2023 partly due to one-time expenditures. Revenue growth slowed from record highs in fiscal 2023, although most states once again ended the year with a budget surplus as revenues exceeded projections.

Most fiscal 2024 budgets are assuming continued slower spending growth. Revenue forecasts for fiscal 2024 remain conservative.

States have taken steps to prepare for an economic slowdown. Actions include building up rainy day funds, using one-time funds for one-time purposes, making additional pension payments, and paying down long-term debt.





Fiscal 2023 Revenue Collections


- Most states ended fiscal 2023 with a budget surplus as tax collections once again came in above projections
- States originally forecasted revenues would decline 3.1 percent in FY23 following double-digit growth in FY21 and FY22
- Vast majority of states have reported full-year fiscal 2023 tax collections have come in above original forecasts
- While most states had a budget surplus in FY23, the amount in nearly all cases has been less than FY22

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


Year-Over-Year Percentage Increases in Total State Expenditures*



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

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Rainy Day Funds Remain at or Near All-Time Highs After Steep Rise from Fiscal 2020 to Fiscal 2022

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
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
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
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




















Motor Fuel Taxes Gradually Decline as a Share of Transportation Revenue as Other Sources Grow

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




Analysis of Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) – through 6/30/22

- According to data released by the U.S. Treasury, states have adopted budgets for \$171.6 billion (86 percent) of their total SLFRF projects
- States have obligated \$138.3 billion of budgeted funds
- States have cumulative expenditures of \$100.2 billion
- States have until December 31, 2024, to obligate the funds and until December 31, 2026, to fully expend the funds

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


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Variations in State Revenue Forecasting Processes How Often States Release Official Revenue Estimates During Fiscal Year How States Develop Revenue Forecasts 12 states


Developing the Budget Proposal

- Agencies submit budget requests to the governor, and sometimes directly to the legislature too
- Governor's budget is introduced as a bill(s) in legislature in 36 states and 3 territories
- Additionally, a budget proposal is developed by a joint legislative body (prior to budget votes in either legislative chamber) in 15 states and 1 territory



Enacting the Budget

In all but 3 states, a simple majority vote is generally sufficient to pass budget

Tax/revenue increases sometimes require supermajority

Number of bills comprising enacted budget ranges from 1 to 150+

Capital appropriations are co-located with operating appropriations in just over half of states

44 states*, 3 territories & DC provide for line-item veto authority over appropriation amounts

38 states, 3 territories & DC with line-item veto power have a supermajority vote requirement for legislature to override

30 states, 2 territories & DC grant line-item veto authority over appropriation language

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


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Gubernatorial Authority After Budget Enactment
