- Grounded in data and evidence



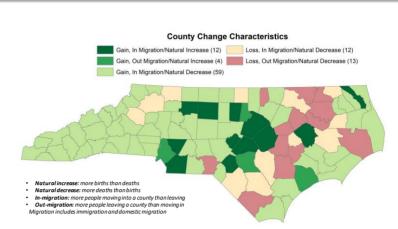

Migration Important for Continued Growth

Population in **75 counties** grew between July 1, 2020 – July 1, 2021

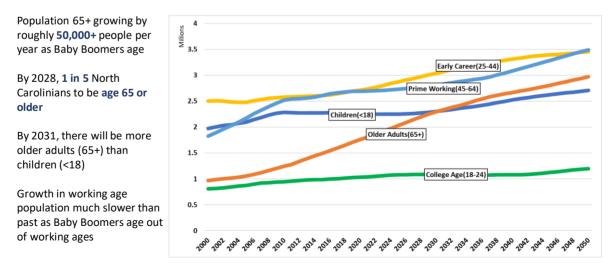
Of the **25** counties with population losses, most were located in eastern North Carolina and all were rural

Without *migration*, the population in **59 growing counties** would have decreased

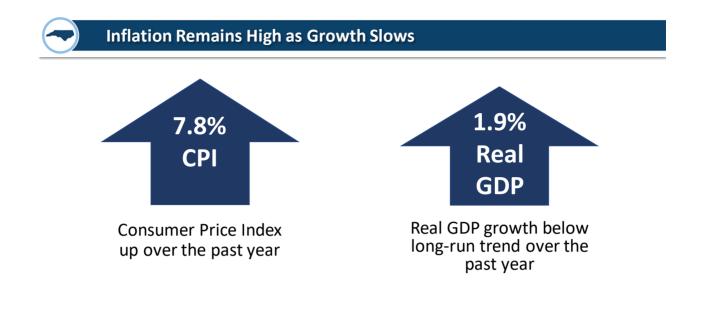

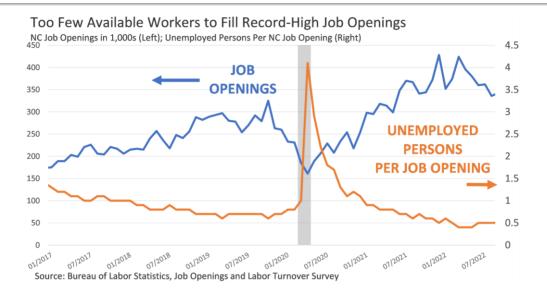


Wage Growth Rising But Not Keeping Pace With Inflation

Near-Term Outlook

Growth in 2023

- · Recession expected within next 6-12 months, but will likely be mild
- Anticipated decline in US real GDP of less than 1%

Inflation & Supply Chains

- · Supply-chain challenges are improving
- Inflation has broadened from pandemic-affected sectors to include most goods and services
- Recent signs of inflation pressures easing but too early to know if trends will persist

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State Revenue

Fiscal Year 2022-23

- FY 2022-23 certified revenues projected 8% lower than FY 2021-22 due to **tax cuts** and one-time factors *but*...
- Revenue collections through October *higher than expected* due to strong sales tax and corporate income tax collections

Looking Ahead

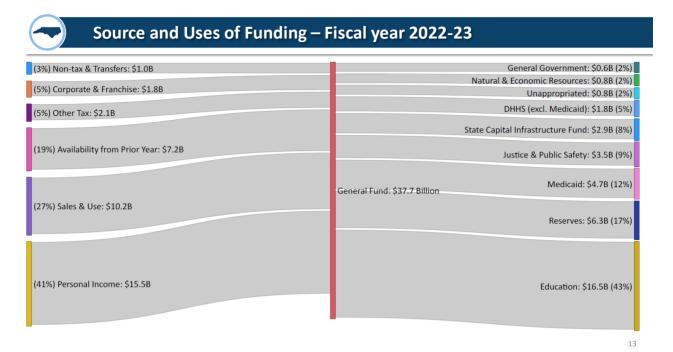
- Inflation-adjusted revenue growth is likely to be below long-run averages due to changing economic outlook and phase in of lower income tax rates
- Revenue unlikely to keep pace with inflation + population

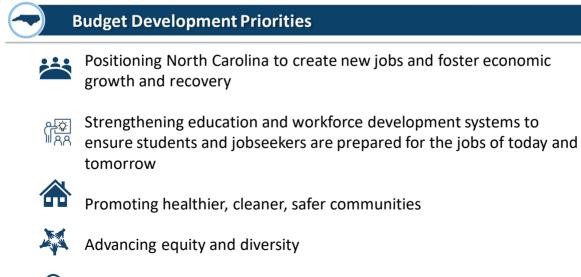


2021 Appropriations Act

- Phases down the personal income tax rate to 3.99% by 2027
- Increases the standard deduction to \$25.5k for married filing jointly taxpayers and \$12.75k for single/married filing separately taxpayers
- · Increases and expands eligibility for the child deduction
- Repeals the corporate income tax over six years from 2025-2030

Ensuring an effective, accountable, well-run state government

Medicaid Expansion

- Under Covid Public Health Emergency, enrollment has increased by 30 percent
- NC's uninsured rate almost 2 percentage points above national average
- Under expansion...
 - 600k more people would have healthcare
 - \$1.4 billion in bonus funds from federal government
 - Could create +37,200 jobs
 - Increase annual state tax revenues by \$200 million

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How Will OSBM Evaluate Budget Requests

- 1. Strength of business case, including details on:
 - The problem
 - How the request will solve the problem
 - Expected impact
- 2. Use of evidence and/or data
 - How likely will the program or service achieve expected outputs/outcomes? Why?
 - How will agencies collect and measure program data? How does this request support data collection and analysis?
- 3. Clear agency strategic plan alignment



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
